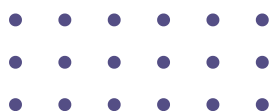
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Just the Facts 1st Grade Non Fiction Reading Curriculum Map

In order to provide a balanced literacy program for students there is a need for them to read and develop comprehension skills using non-fiction materials. This resource provides them with that opportunity. Nine non fiction stories help students develop comprehension skills.

Each subject area covers the following reading format:

- **Before I Read** which develops reasoning, critical thinking skills, and vocabulary development skills to be used prior to reading the passage.
- **While I Read** which develops comprehension, analysis, application, and critical thinking skills during the reading of the passage.
- **After I Read** which focuses on comprehension, summary, and evaluation skills after the passage has been read.
